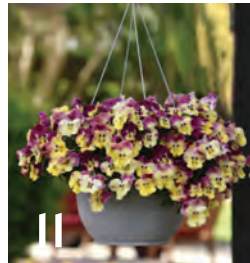

The Arrow Shop Targets All Your Archery Needs

When it comes to all things archery, The Arrow Shop hits the bulls-eye. Owners Miles and Kelli Blair are passionate about the sport and aim to provide everything local archers might need or want.

"Our mission is to promote the sport of archery. It's a sport you can do for personal achievement, recreation and competition," said Kelli, "but it's also a sport that you can put food on the table."

With hunting season in full swing, The Arrow Shop is committed to providing the best equipment and service, so area bow hunters are well-prepared to fill their freezers with fresh meat.

But Kelli also pointed out that archery is not just a seasonal sport. "It's a year-round sport," she said. "In addition to hunting, there are competitions for people who enjoy expanding their archery skills during any season, with opportunities to compete both indoors and outdoors."

With that in mind, Miles and Kelli decided to include an indoor range when they built their new location. The beautiful building is located at 131 N. Osage Avenue in Dewey. The 20-yard, climate controlled, indoor range offers 20 comfortably-spaced shooting lanes, and an additional 4-lane, 10-yard range is also available for beginners. The shooting ranges are open during regular business hours.

In addition to offering a practice space, The Arrow Shop can help archers improve their skills by customizing the equipment to each person's level of skill and interest, as well as providing various services and maintenance.

When you buy a bow from The Arrow Shop, they strive to make sure it is not only the right bow for your needs, but it is suited to you and your shooting style. They carry a wide range of compound bows, traditional style bows — longbows and recurves, as well as crossbows. There are bows available for youth to adult. "Having a bow properly fitted for each individual allows an archer to become a more efficient shooter," said Kelli.

Ongoing maintenance of your equipment will ensure many years of safe shooting. Each time an archer takes their bow out to shoot, they should inspect for general wear and tear. An annual inspection by an experienced bow technician is recommended for a more detailed evaluation and tune-up. "Bow tune-ups will help you shoot more accurately and safely," said Miles. "Bow tuning will also give you more confidence that your equipment is performing most efficiently," he added. "We want to make sure you are set up with the right bow for your shooting type."



In addition to providing expert advice regarding setting up a bow to fit you, The Arrow Shop will also help in selecting the correct arrows for your bow. Shooting an incorrect arrow can not only cause frustration and be less effective, but it can also be dangerous. They carry multiple options of quality arrows ready to be cut to the custom length for the most efficient arrow flight.

While they carry many of the same brands you will find in the big box stores at the same competitive prices, they also carry bows, arrows and other archery accessories you will only find at professional archery stores like The Arrow Shop.

Miles' dad purchased Miles' first bow from Mr. Pocock when Miles was about 13 years old. Miles started hunting not long after that, and even though his dad was not a hunter, he made sure Miles had strong hunting mentors who taught him to hunt. Miles is a world, national, and state champion archer with several years of competition and hunting under his belt. He is a Vegas World Champion, a two-time NFAA Indoor National Champion and was inducted into the Oklahoma State Archery Association Hall of Fame in 2011. He likes to work with those wanting to excel at a higher level.

While Kelli grew up in the rural area and was part of a hunting and outdoors loving family, she didn't begin to participate in archery until she married Miles. She shot for fun and competitively. Kelli didn't go on her first hunting trip until 2012 when she and Miles went to Africa for their 30th wedding anniversary. Kelli also has competed locally and nationally and has recently begun hunting. She primarily works with beginners and intermediate archers of all ages. Kelli and Miles are USA Archery Level 2 Certified Instructors.

The Arrow Shop offers classes and private lessons in individual as well as group settings. Adults and children ages 8 and up can learn based on their skill and level of interest. "We customize the lessons based on our student's individual goals," said Kelli. "We help them determine which equipment they will need and what level of coaching they desire. We are dedicated to helping people practice and expand their archery skills."

Every quilt uses the same panel, or piece of fabric, but no two quilts are alike. Each are designed by an individual with a different background, skill level, and age. It is incredible to see the vast differences between quilts even though the same fabric has been used for each.

Even those who are not a quilters will enjoy this incredible show of talent, creativity, and tenacity all used to honor our Veterans.

If you are interested in learning more about quilting or sewing, Quilter's Hideaway offers classes for all ages. Working in a time of Covid has been difficult, but private and outdoor classes has allowed the love of quilting to continue on.

How To Get Growing

This Fall

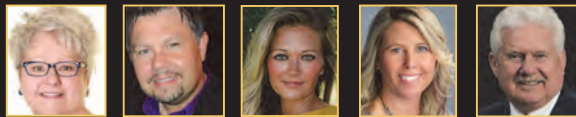

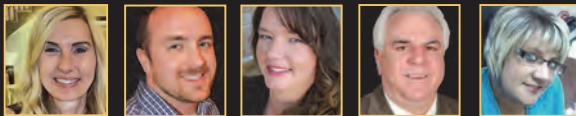

5 Fall Tips for Protecting Your Pet's Health

(BPT) - Whether fall is when you switch out your exercise regimen or schedule your annual flu shot, staying healthy is at the top of most "to do" lists right now. Just remember your four-legged family members when considering seasonal changes to your wellness program. Fall is the perfect time to take steps to keep pets healthy, too.

1) Plan that vet visit. Annual check-ups that include immunizations, physical exams, routine blood work and prescription refills are as important to pet health as they are to human health. Routine wellness visits can also save pet-care dollars in the long run through preventive care and early disease detection. If your pet missed his or her annual check-up last spring, consider getting that visit rescheduled. Most veterinarians offer pet wellness appointments with curbside drop-off and pick-up to help safeguard owners' health.

2) Get off the couch. Summer's heat is giving way to cooler temperatures, so resist the temptation to forgo your dog's evening walk for yet another movie marathon. Not only will outdoor exercise help whittle your pet's waistline and promote joint health, but getting outside to enjoy the fall colors can boost your own caloric burn and mental outlook as well.

3) Don't "fall" back on parasite prevention. Just because you aren't slapping mosquitoes like you did in July doesn't mean you should stop protecting your pets from parasites. The American Heartworm Society recommends giving heartworm preventives -

many of which prevent a host of common parasites - to dogs and cats year-round. While heartworms are spread by mosquitoes, it's nearly impossible to guess when you'll see the last one in the fall or the first one next spring. Disease-carrying mosquitoes can also survive as temperatures drop by migrating indoors or to protected areas near houses and other buildings.

4) Rethink your pet's fall wardrobe. Protective wearables make more than a fashion statement for many pets. Arthritic senior dogs, as well as short-haired dogs or lean breeds that chill easily, will be more comfortable if you slip on a cozy fleece coat when clipping on their leash. Just make sure your pup's garment has a snug vs. a tight fit - and consider coats with reflective fabric if you favor nighttime walks. And if your fall activities include hunting with your dog, make sure to outfit your four-legged companion with a hunting vest.

5) Hide the Halloween treats. Whether or not your kids go trick-or-treating this year, you may be making plans to stock up on Halloween candy. Just remember that certain human treats may be toxic to your pets. Chocolate is hazardous to both dogs and cats, sugar can throw off your pet's electrolyte balance and certain artificial sweeteners can cause liver failure in dogs. So go ahead and keep the candy to yourself. Just keep it away from your pets while you're at it.

Staying healthy has never felt more important than it does this fall. Do your pets a favor and prioritize their health, too.
