One of the diagnostic aids Dr. Parchuri uses is the Fortin Finger Test. It is a simple, reliable diagnostic aid.

The patient is asked to point to the location of their primary pain. If it is below L5, then the doctor considers the SI joint. If it is above L5, he focuses on lumbar spine etiologies.

If non-surgical therapy fails to provide lasting relief, Dr. Parchuri and his patients may consider surgical options. The iFuse Implant System is a minimally invasive treatment option to treat some SI joint disorders. The titanium iFuse Implants are surgically inserted to fuse the joint and eliminate pain.

Dr. Parchuri said, "15-30 percent of patients with chronic low back pain may have pain arising from the sacroiliac (SI) joint, yet most physicians are not trained to consider the SI joint when evaluating lower back pain. If you are experiencing lower back pain, it may be coming from your SI joint."

The sacrum attaches to the large pelvic bones known as the ilia. The joints that connect the sacrum to the ilia are call the sacroiliac (SI) joints. These joints transfer weight and forces between your upper body and legs. SI joint degeneration can be caused by degenerative disease, trauma, pregnancy/childbirth, prior lumbar fusion, and other causes.

Injury to the ligaments, muscles, or other soft tissues supporting the SI joint may alter the ability of the SI joint to effectively change to new positions and/or transfer load during routine physical activities.

SI joint symptoms may present as pain, or feelings of numbness, weakness, or tingling in the lower back, buttock and/or legs. Symptoms may be similar to those from other spine conditions such as a herniated disc or a compressed nerve root.

Dr. Parchuri uses iFuse-3D implants. The 3D-printed surface mimics cancellous bone. The implants demonstrate substantial bone ongrowth, ingrowth, through growth, and imploys self-harvesting technology.

Another potential treatment he uses is iFuse Bedrock, which provides "fixation, fusion, and foundation," according to Dr. Parchuri. "Data shows a 30-percent reduction in SI joint motion by adding iFuse Bedrock to sacral-alar-iliac screws.

"Please contact us if you would like to schedule an examination to evaluate your lumbar spine and sacroiliac joint," added Dr. Parchuri.

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

Nicole Woodruff, founder of Beautiful Bellies and mother of a 7year-old and a 2-year-old, is a certified ultrasound technician who helps parents see their unborn babies using 2D, 3D, 4D, and 5D ultrasound. "I started Beautiful Bellies to give expecting moms a unique experience to see their baby throughout all stages of their pregnancy," said Nicole. "When I was pregnant, the obstetrician only gave two ultrasounds the entire 9 months! I know for most of us moms, that's not enough. So I created a space where parents can come and see their baby whenever they want - from early stages to the end of the third trimester."

Beautiful Bellies Pregnancy Ultrasound opened in October 2020, because Nicole saw a real need in Bartlesville for prenatal ultrasound services. "Everyone used to have to travel to Tulsa or Jenks to get an ultrasound, and I thought that we should have a clinic in Bartlesville," she said.

Beautiful Bellies offers ultrasounds at the various stages of pregnancy. Sweet Beginnings package is available from 5-13 weeks gestation. Blue or Pink - Gender Ultrasound is available from 14-36 weeks and A Beautiful Moment 4D/5D has a 20-minute or 30-minute option. The 30-minute one comes with discounts to local massage

and photography. The Peace of Mind ultrasound can be done anytime from 7 weeks to full-term.

"The 4D/5D is an incredible way to see baby's features before they get here, and you will have a wonderful time watching your precious new baby," said Nicole.

The business employs a licensed, certified phlebotomist to draw blood, which can be used to determine the gender of the baby in as early as 8 weeks gestation. The testing is 99.9 percent accurate.

In addition, there are various add-ons available to purchase, including heartbeat animals, gender reveal confetti cannons or smoke bombs, gender confetti balloons. The baby's weight can be determined and customers can choose to have all the pictures and videos from the session saved onto a USB.

To give back to the community, Nicole works with a non-profit organization called Heaven's Babies to help moms who are experiencing loss.

Guest #6, wow is a good start for this one! It took awhile for Guest #6 to realize their part in receiving help, but that day came and they are now in OKC receiving the proper care needed to develop a healthy, drug-free life.

Guest #7, was taken into care by Grand Lake Mental Health Center and received benefits that they qualified for under the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Guest #8 & 9, both veterans, are now receiving benefits owed to them for their service to their/our nation, including housing allowances, medical care, and food benefits.

Guest #10, is being cared for by a local church and its congregation, while they work through their issues.

Guest #11 & 12, became clients under GLMHC and began receiving benefits.

Guest #13, entered into a local shelter and received counseling for depression.

Guest #14, reportedly moved to southern Oklahoma and is doing much better.

Guest #15 to 20, chose to return to their life as before the storm and we wish them well, knowing that if at any time we can help, we will do our best!

CGA research found that a third of American homeowners have been affected by a utility service interruption during the pandemic. This can be particularly frustrating as people spend more time at home, relying on essential utilities to work, study, and stay entertained. You don't want your digging activity to be the reason your neighborhood faces an inconvenient outage, or worse.

If you think it won't happen, think again. "A utility line is damaged every few minutes in the U.S. because someone decided to dig without making a call to 811 to learn the approximate location of buried utilities in their area," said Sarah Magruder Lyle, President and CEO of CGA. "Calling 811 to get utilities marked before digging

is free and easy, and will protect you, your community, and the utilities you rely on."

Follow these safe digging steps each time you dig:

Step 1: A free phone call to 811 makes it easy for your local one call center to notify appropriate utility companies of your intent to dig. Call a few days prior to digging to ensure enough time for the approximate location of utility lines to be marked with flags or paint.

Step 2: Know where you plan to dig and have a basic idea of what you plan to do. When you call 811, a representative from your local one call center will ask for the location and description of your digging project.

Step 3: Your local one call center will notify affected utility companies, which will then send professional locators to the proposed dig site to mark the approximate location of buried utility lines with colored flags and paint.

Step 4: Wait the required amount of time for the lines to be marked. Once all lines have been accurately marked, carefully dig around the marked areas.

There are nearly 20 million miles of underground utility lines in the United States, which equates to more than a football field's length of utilities for every person in the U.S. Your family depends on this buried infrastructure for your everyday needs, including electric, natural gas, water and sewer, cable TV, high-speed internet, and landline telephone.

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
