

"Women tend to be viewed as a 'weaker' target," Daniel said. "Here at Guns of Glory, we have decided to get a step ahead of the target and offer a females-only group."

Led by Guns of Glory's very own Heather Kelley, Steel Grace members will gather twice a month and offer support, fellowship, and firearms training to women who sign up. Heather has seven years of shooting

on-one training with some of the best in the field. "I am looking forward to sharing my knowledge and experience with Steel Grace members," she said.

most important things to Heather are serving God and being a good mother. In addition to being a busy mother and working at Guns of Glory, Heather sings on her church's worship team, helps with the single moms group, and is on her church's security team.

"My vision for Steel Grace is to bring quality firearms training and information geared to the mindset of women," she said. "I hope the knowledge I share with the group will empower women to keep themselves and their families safe."

Members do not have to own a firearm to join, because Guns of Glory offers rentals. Pistol rentals are \$10 and rifles are \$15.

"We will be glad to help you become more familiar with the firearms available and help you find one that is perfect for you," said Daniel. "We do our best to bring a variety of manufacturers for you to choose from."

Due to the limited amount of space and for safety reasons, reservations are required to attend the monthly shoots. A bi-weekly email is sent with a variety of information on the upcoming events. To RSVP, you can visit info@gogok2a.com to reserve your space.

Steel Grace meets on the first and third Thursdays of every month. Members can choose to meet from 10 a.m. to noon or from 6-8 p.m. at Guns of Glory, located at 427 S. Osage Ave., in Dewey.

There are two membership levels offered in Steel Grace. SG1 is a six-month membership that costs \$75 with a discounted range fee of \$15. SG2 is a 12-month membership for \$150, a discounted range fee of \$15, and an additional 10-percent discount at the pro shop. This discount excludes firearms and any additional training and rentals. Members of your family will receive discounts on Steel Grace memberships, as well.

A prerequisite for joining Steel Grace is a safety class that is offered at no additional cost. Those classes are held on the second and fourth Thursday of every month at your choice of 10 a.m. to noon or 5-7 p.m.

Daniel opened Guns of Glory with the goal of having a place where people who didn't know anything about firearms could be trained and build confidence in handling firearms safely and shooting them proficiently, so their fears about firearms would subside.

"I wanted to offer training for people who wanted to be able to defend themselves and others from criminals who do not follow laws," said Daniel.

He is hopeful that as people learn more about firearms safety and handling, they can find the fun and joy in shooting a tiny hole accurately through a target all the way down range.

"There is a reason it's a sport," he shared. "It takes skill. When you learn a new skill, you are able to take pride in your new abilities and feel more confident in yourself. This is what brings joy to people when they shoot. I wanted to spread the joy I have into the hearts of everyone who visits Guns of Glory."

Governor Visits Bartlesville's Bloomin' Tails

Former Inmates hope to lend a helping paw to others

Oklahoma Gov. Kevin Stitt recently visited a new Bartlesville business to congratulate its owners on a job well done.

While Stitt was traveling around Green Country on March 31 for some campaign events, he stopped by Bloomin' Tails Pet Day Spa, which is owned by two former prison inmates who turned their lives around and want to help others do the same.

Owners Michele "Micki" McNutt and Sandra Conway met while they were incarcerated in the Mabel Bassett Correctional Center in McLoud, Okla. The women went to prison for trafficking methamphetamine and met in The Guardian Angel's Program while there.

"We want the world to see how we've turned our lives around," said Micki. "We're still in contact with women in prison, and so we like to mentor them and tell them what it's like out here.

"There are still people who need a second chance," she added. "I tell them it's not what they've done. It's what they do from here forward that makes a difference."

Conway was released in 2017 under judicial review and Micki was released in January 2020. Both women went on to receive further training in a Tulsa-based non-profit through Muddy Paws – Pets Helping People. Muddy Paws provides training for women with criminal backgrounds and prepares them for careers in the pet care industry. Conway graduated from Muddy Paws in November 2018 and Micki in July 2020.

The Muddy Paws program provides "a path for re-entry into





society for anyone desiring to work hard and to be self-sustaining," according to the website, www.muddy-paws.org. "The growing dog grooming industry offers a solid career path for individuals with felonies and criminal backgrounds."

Sandra said the Muddy Paws program teaches women a skill and helps reduce recidivism.

Sandra and Micki worked hard and were also blessed with grants through the department of rehabilitation to help open Bloomin' Tails Pet Day Spa in October 2021.

"We want to give a huge thank you to everyone who is helping us achieve our dreams," said Sandra. "We are very proud of how far we have come in such a short amount of time."

In January of last year, Kacy Jones joined the team of professionals at Bloomin' Tails. Kacy has a different background; she has never been incarcerated. She received her training at the hands of her mother, Tracy Jones, who has been a dog groomer for 35 years and owns a dog salon in Indiana.

Kacy has more than 10 years of experience as a dog groomer. In addition, she attended a dog training school in Ohio last year and is now a certified dog trainer in multiple disciplines.

Conway and McNutt said they hope to expand their business, possibly open another location and hire other former prisoners.

The FDA has determined that the Mobi-C disc replacement is better than fusion after seven years, for the two-level cervical disc replacement. Mobi-C had fewer subsequent surgeries after 84 months.

Mobi-C was designed to adapt to the instantaneous axis of rotation through its self-adjusting mobile core. It is designed to aid in motion similar to natural cervical spine motion. It moves with the spine.

Mobi-C's core is designed to create low stress at the implant-to-bone interface. There are no invasive screws, no bone removal for preparation and no additional operative steps. It is a one-step insertion with no drilling or chiseling needed.

The City of Bartlesville will hold its next free residential yard debris collection May 9-13.

The event is typically held twice each year, in the spring and fall, to help Bartlesville solid waste utility customers dispose of dead leaves and other yard debris for no extra cost.

The collection is for the following items only:


- Leaves
- Grass
- Lawn clippings
- Limbs and branches if cut in lengths no longer than four feet and bundled (may not exceed 50 pounds)

During this week only, yard debris bags will not require yard waste stickers, and clear or colored bags are allowed. The collection is for private residences only; no commercial collections will be made.

There is no limit on the number of bags a resident can put out for the collection. Extra bags or items of household refuse outside the cart must have the red refuse sticker attached.

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












"The next day John saw Jesus coming toward him, and said, 'Behold! The Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world!" — John 1:29

Scripture confirms that Jesus is the Lamb of God, but did you know that being that Lamb is directly connected with biblical Passover or the Feast of Unleavened Bread, in addition to Easter?

Passover and Easter, How are They Connected?

While many things connect Passover and Easter historically and biblically, Jesus is at the heart of the connection. However, to understand this, we need to take a look at Passover; as this is what Jesus and His disciples were celebrating at 'The Last Supper.'

Do you remember Joseph, son of Jacob/Israel? Through God he saved Egypt and became second only to Pharoah. Yet, when new pharaohs came to power who did not remember this, things changed. The pharaohs enslaved the numerous and prosperous Israelites out of fear, and for hundreds of years the decedents of Israel suffered, crying out to God.

God heard their cries and sent Moses before the ruling pharaoh, telling Pharaoh to 'let His people go,' but Pharaoh would not listen. Thus, God sent nine plagues, giving Pharaoh an opportunity to let His people go after each; but Pharaoh still would not act. At last, God had Moses and the children of Israel take an unblemished lamb and spread its blood upon the doorposts of their homes, so that the tenth plague — the death of the firstborn — would 'pass over' them.

The blood of the unblemished lamb set apart those who were walking as God's children, from those who were not. It was a sign to all; redeeming those who applied it.

During the days of Jesus, Passover still involved the sacrifice of unblemished lambs; though, instead of the blood being spread

upon doorposts, it went upon the altar of God. Annually this occurred, with the lamb's bones not being broken and its blood poured out before God for the sake of His children.

'The Last Supper' was a part of Passover. Jesus knew what was to come, that He — innocent and unblemished — would become our Passover Lamb. That, as with the lambs He had seen sacrificed, His Blood would be poured out upon the altar and upon the doorposts of our hearts so we might be redeemed and set apart.

"Get rid of the old yeast, so that you may be a new unleavened batch—as you really are. For Christ, our Passover lamb, has been sacrificed." — 1 Corinthians 5:7 (NIV)

Today, Easter is meant to celebrate the resurrection of Jesus. Of the Lamb, overcoming death and the grave; sealing us as those set apart and redeemed!

Passover and Easter connect Jesus' choice to become the Lamb and His sealing the work through Life and the Blood.

Jesus is risen! However, His sacrifice as our Passover Lamb is what gives the resurrection power and purpose! It is what takes it from one of Jesus' miracles to an incredible supernatural shift; it is the combination of the sacrifice and resurrection that truly redeems!

Spring Lawn Care Tasks

(BPT) — Now that it is spring, many homeowners are looking forward to spending time in their yards — but not before doing some spring cleanup. In a recent survey by TruGreen, at least one-quarter of 2,000 survey respondents plan to start spring cleanup in March; April is the second-most popular month. In addition, a number of outdoor tasks are at the top of homeowners' to-do lists this year, including: mowing the lawn (46%); raking leaves (43%); pruning bushes (40%); gardening and planting trees/shrubs (39%); pest control (39%); and weeding (37%).

Although spring cleanup can seem daunting - with 68% of respondents agreeing that their spring cleanup always feels overwhelming - TruGreen, the nation's leading lawn care provider, breaks down the list of top tasks to help you take it one step at a time. Clean up debris

Use a rake to remove dead leaves, sticks, twigs and matted grass. If left on the ground, this layer of plant detritus can smother your lawn, leaving dead patches in your yard. Clearing this debris also makes way for lawn treatments, if necessary, to further improve your outdoor space.

Pro Tip: To protect your lawn from damage, rake when the ground is not soft, wet or muddy.

Beat the weeds

Weeds can be a huge nuisance for homeowners, and it's important to fight these off early.

"Although keeping weeds at bay can be an ongoing chore, partnering with a lawn care specialist, such as TruGreen, can help alleviate this burden," says Brian Feldman, director of technical operations at TruGreen. "Get an expert assessment of your weed problem and develop a tailored treatment plan early to help you achieve a weed-free yard."

Pro Tip: Get a jump on weeds early to prevent them from becoming stubborn problems in the future.

Cut the grass

After a long, dormant winter, your lawn deserves a new spring cut, so tune up that mower and get ready to manicure your blades of glory. Wait until grass is about three inches long and the ground isn't soft. Most grass should be kept at least two inches tall - as longer, thicker turf helps combat weeds and conserve water in the soil. Plus, grass that is cut too short lets in more sunlight, which can give room for weeds to seize the day and germinate.

Pro Tip: Avoid cutting the lawn too short in dry weather. The grass tends to develop shallow roots, making the lawn susceptible to drought stress.

"Our survey found that 62% of homeowners will hire a professional to complete their outdoor spring cleanup," said Feldman. "Not only will this help complete all your tasks, but it can ensure a healthy lawn this spring - and beyond - by implementing optimal treatments from the start."

Hydrate your lawn

No matter where you are in the country, lawns need water. Nearly 48% of survey respondents say they plan to update their landscaping, so it's important to water early and consistently. Natural watering will come from rainfall. During hotter, drier months, however, you'll likely need to supplement nature's bounty with your garden hose. Water before 10 a.m. when it's still cool. Winds also tend to be calmer earlier in the day, so water soaks into the soil for grass roots to absorb before it evaporates. Aim for about an inch of water per week.

Pro Tip: Measure an inch of water by spreading a few empty tuna cans across your lawn as you water. When they're full, you've watered an inch.

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Utility Rate Increases on Tap



city of bartlesville Increases Start in July

The City Council earlier this month approved a utility rate increase proposed by consultant NewGen Strategies that will take effect July 1 for all city water, wastewater, and solid waste customers.



"The rate increases for all City services - water, wastewater, and solid waste - for the average customer, who uses about 6,000 gallons of water per month, is an approximately 7.5 percent, for Fiscal Year 2023," said CFO/City Clerk Jason Muninger. "It drops slightly each year after that, with 5.5 percent in 2024, 5.2 percent

in 2025, and 4 percent in 2026."

The five-year rate plan will recover the cost of operations and capital needs through 2026, which includes the purchase of a new Automated Meter Infrastructure System, upgrades to the City's sanitation collection equipment, and ongoing wastewater infrastructure needs.

Automated Meter Infrastructure System

According to Water Utilities Director Terry Lauritsen, a new AMI system is needed due to high failure rates with the current system.

"In 2013, the City installed an automated meter infrastructure system for water meters that replaced existing, manually-read meters with meters that automatically read and reported data at predetermined intervals to the City," Lauritsen said. "The cost of that system was \$3.8 million. Unfortunately, it has not worked as promised, and we have experienced a 98 percent failure rate with the meter transmitters. This has resulted in the replacement of the transmitters on 16,086 of the City's total 16,403 meters."

Lauritsen reported to the council in March that Mueller Water Products, the company contracted for the existing system, has experienced high failure rates not only in Bartlesville but other municipalities as well, and that the product has fallen far short of what was promised by the company upon implementation.

"City staff has replaced 18,925 nodes, a small part that sits on top of the meter and serves as the meter transmitter," Lauritsen said. "This means we've replaced this part on the entire system plus some. Additionally, there are large delays in receiving warranty parts, and the City is now entering into the pro-rated portion of the warranty."

He said that between 2023-2028, it is anticipated the current system would cost an additional \$300,000 per year to continue replacing the meter transmitters. He said the City could opt to stay with Mueller and pay \$350,000 for a necessary upgrade along with the additional \$300,000 per year for component replacements, or install a different AMI system. A new system with Mueller would cost approximately \$1.5 million; however, while the company has verbally agreed to guarantee the system's performance, it declined to do so in writing, Lauritsen said.

The rate increases include the cost to install a new system under a different provider for an estimated \$7.5 million. This option

is required to interface with the City's software system to allow online bill payment, which is another of the many functions promised with the existing system that failed to deliver as promised, Lauritsen said. A final option would be to go back to manual reads for an estimated \$250,000 plus to the cost of associated software.

Water

The water rate increases approved by the council Monday allows for the anticipated purchase of a new AMI system and continues implementation of inclining block rate structure and capital improvement fees.

Water rate increases and Water Capital Investment Fees approved by the council Monday will cost the average residential customer a total of approximately seven percent more beginning July 2022, with similar increases occurring in 2024, 2025, and 2026.

Wastewater

Similar increases were approved for wastewater and Wastewater Capital Investment Fees. Capital needs that include the impending expansion of the existing Chickasaw Wastewater Treatment Plan and improvements to the City's four pump stations and pipelines necessitate the increases in wastewater rates. In all, upgrades to wastewater infrastructure is expected to cost upwards of \$60 million.

Solid Waste

Solid Waste services rates will increase \$1 per month for the next three years to cover equipment costs, bringing the total cost for residential use with one cart from \$17 per month currently to \$20 in 2025, with no increase planned for 2026.
